# Dr. Jimothy Seelig

The 22nd season of the Turtle Creek Chorale marks Dr. Seelig's 15th as Artistic Director. Under his leadership, the chorale has continued to push the world of male choral music to new heights. His vision for the organization is only rivaled by his sense of humor and desire to entertain.

Possessed with a multiple talent disorder, Dr. Seelig is conductor, educator, singer and father. He holds four degrees including Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of North Texas and the Diploma in Lieder and Oratorio from the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria, and is Adjunct Assistant Professor at Southern Methodist University.

As a singer, he made his European operatic debut as a member of the Staatsoper in St. Gallen, Switzerland and his solo recital debut at Carnegie Hall. He has a solo CD entitled *EVERYTHING POSSIBLE* which was produced to benefit three local AIDS organizations. In 2001, he sang "One Voice" from SING FOR THE CURE, to kick off the national Race for the Cure at the foot of the Washington Monument. The race, the largest race of its kind in history, had over 72,000 runners.

Dr. Seelig has been honored with the President's Citation as distinguished alumnus of the University of North Texas, was the first male recipient of the Extra Mile Award for service to the women's community and carried the Olympic Torch through Dallas as a community hero in 1996. 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
